School Got Clean Bill in October Fire Inspection

Our Lady of The Angels School, which burned yester-day, is a two-story building on the northeast corner of Avers avenue and Iowa street.

It was built in 1910 and remodeled seven years ago. Construction is brick, with wood trim in the corridors and in the large, classrooms with their high ceilings.

Chief Robert O'Brien, of the fire prevention bureau, said the school was inspected early in October, during Fire Prevention Week, and found to be in compliance with the safety code. No violations were reported.

1,200 IN CLASS

The school had an enrollment of 1,635 in eight grades and kindergarten. About 1,-200 pupils were in class yesterday when fire flashed through the second floor of the north wing.

This wing is approximately 50 by 100 feet, with eight classrooms on each floor. There are at least six exits, three at the front and three near the rear.






DIAGRAM of Our Lady of Angels School shows burned areas where many bodies of young victims were found.
